



OPIOIDS & SUBSTANCE USE DISORDER RESOURCES

The goal of the Drug Overdose Prevention Program at Southeastern Idaho Public Health is advancing opioid prevention work through public and prescriber education, local capacity building, public safety partnerships, and the social determinants of health. We have the opportunity to share with you the resources we have to help further your work regarding substance use disorder.

In 2020, there were 287 deaths related to any drug overdose in Idaho. Out of those, 164 were related to an opioid overdose. There were 4,548 emergency department visits related to any drug overdose and 1,209,805 prescriptions for opioids just in Idaho. Substance use disorder (SUD) is a serious problem in the United States, however, less than 1 in 10 people with a SUD receive treatment. Medication-Assisted Treatment or MAT is currently the best form of treatment because it uses medication along with behavioral therapies to help those with a SUD manage their addiction to live a normal life.

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Opioid Prescribing Data

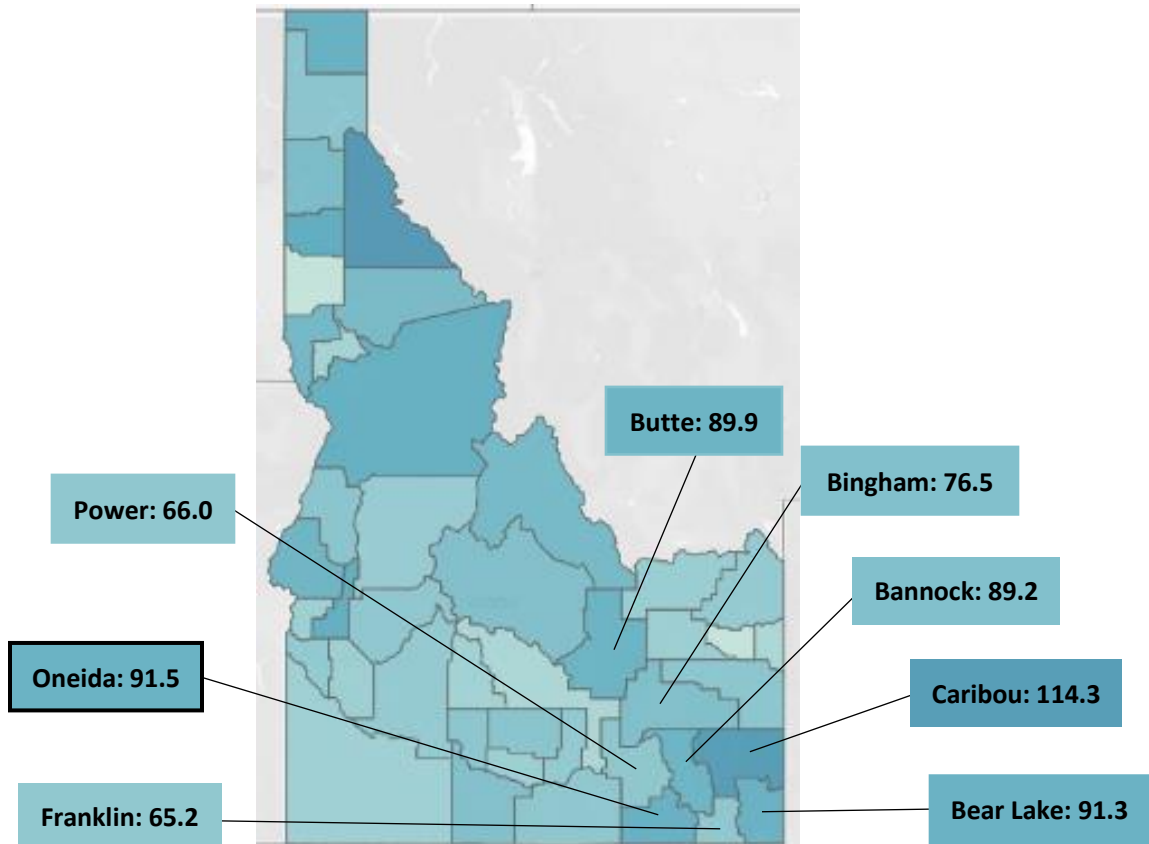

FREE NALOXONE

Who should carry it?

- Anyone who is prescribed opioids or is around someone prescribed opioids
- Anyone who uses illicit opioids or may be around someone who uses illicit opioids
- Anyone who may encounter someone overdosing

How to get it?

- Anyone can get naloxone

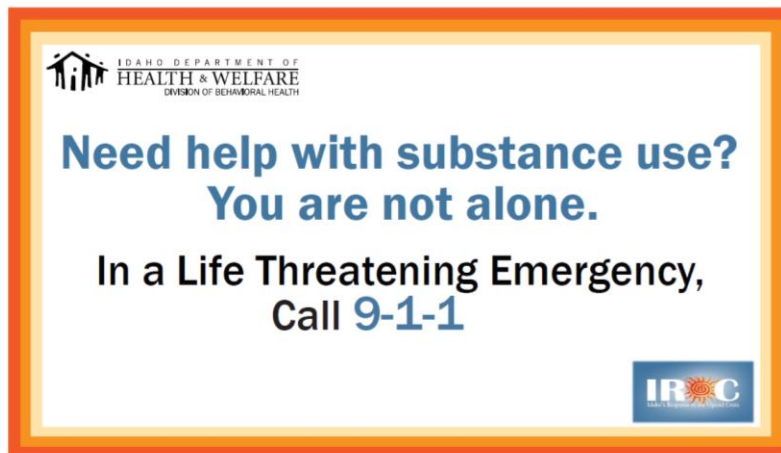


Important Notes

- Naloxone is only effective on overdoses involving opioids
- Individuals overdosing should receive medical services immediately
- The effects of naloxone only last 30-60 minutes and in some cases with highly potent fentanyl only 20 minutes
- Naloxone should be stored at room temperature

Idaho's Response to the Opioid Crisis (IROC)

The cards shown below are wallet cards that can be ordered for FREE through the Idaho Department of Health and Welfare. It is a great source to hand out to those you come in contact with that may have a substance or opioid use disorder. It provides numbers to call for help, including community resources, treatment, Naloxone, recovery support, and the suicide prevention hotline.
